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## What is the California Healthy Youth Act?

AB329 requires that school districts offer a comprehensive sexual health educational program to all students in grades 7-12, once in middle school and once in high school that addresses:

- Human development, pregnancy, contraception and sexually transmitted infections.
- HIV/AIDS prevention.
- Sexual orientation, gender identity, healthy relationships and behaviors, and sexual harassment, sexual assault, sex trafficking.



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### Parent Communication

- Parents receive a notification letter informing them that students will receive sexual health instruction and that they have the opportunity to review instructional materials. This information is also included in PUSD's Guidelines for Parents.
- A parent or guardian of a student has the right to excuse his or her child from all or part of the comprehensive sexual health education and HIV/AIDS prevention education.
- Parents who do not wish their child to participate in this instruction can opt out by notifying the school in writing.



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### The Committee

A committee of middle and high school science and health teachers met to learn about the new legislation and review and recommend updated supplemental health materials that align to the new requirements.

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### Strengths of the Recommended Programs

Teen Talk Middle School, Health Connected (Grade 7) Be Real. Be Ready., San Francisco Unified School District (High School)

- Fully address information related to pregnancy and HIV/AIDS in accordance with AB 329 requirements
- Present objective, science-based information on sexuality and health relationships
- Materials are developmentally appropriate for age-span



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# **Implementation Timeline**

#### Sexual Health Education Grades 7-12

#### **Spring 2017:**

- Recommend supplemental materials for adoption (presented for Board review).
- Research resources for providing professional development to teachers.

#### <u>2017-18:</u>

- Revise curriculum guides to align to the new program
- Provide professional development for 7th grade science and high school health teachers in these new materials.
