Employee Representative Reports	CSEA Secretary Maria Anguiano shared that CSEA's initial proposal will be sun shining tonight and the association is looking forward to another year of working together. She also shared that CSEA has scholarships available to its members and two Nutrition Service Department member are currently filling out paperwork to be recipients of the scholarships.
	TAP president April O'Connor shared that bargaining took place last week and added that three years ago, there was an agreement made to support K-5 and we continue to encroach on their time. The SDC grievance continues to go around in circles and a continuum doesn't exist. High School grade push in was three hours late and teachers were not able to enter comment information, there are several glitches occurring and teachers are frustrated. The 8 th grade interim test took place and devices were turned on but were not able to log on and steps were not provided. There is a lack of coordination and no clear and concise plan and is confusing. There is frustration that more money is being spent in this department with the opening of a new position as proposed. She is not sure that at this time adding a position would help as there is no clear and concise plan.

Superintendent's Report	 Superintendent Dr. Pérez highlighted the following: Superintendent Pérez shared that the Quartermania event raised almost \$8,000. Dr. Pérez assisted Vision to Learn and Rotary in handing out over 300 eye glasses to PHS students. Dr. Pérez met with Lt. Barragan to discuss a safety program for students and she will be reviewing with the youth commission. Superintendent Pérez will also be meeting with the Youth Commission to review the Strategic Plan. Dr. Pérez shared that the District participated in the Great American Shakeout.

 Superintendent Pérez received great news from the Department of Public Health that they reviewed the District's protocols used for indoor testing and the response was favorable. The letter received will be placed on the District's website under Air Quality.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Paramount Adult School is proposing to offer a Phlebotomy Technician course, beginning Spring of 2018. The course will be offered in partnership with the American University of Medical Technology (AUMT) institute, a registered Phlebotomy School.

AUMT is an institute whose purpose is to help students obtain licensing as California Certified Phlebotomy Technicians. The Phlebotomy Technician course is comprised of 48 lecture hours and 40 hours of practical experience at an externship site. The completion of the program includes an approved national written examination, which is given at AUMT Institute sites. All students who complete the program will have met all of California's requirements to become a Certified Phlebotomy Technician I. Currently, AUMT has four of its own institutional sites as well as offering courses at a number of adult schools and community colleges, which include Santa Monica, LA Harbor, Palm Desert and El Camino. Presently, the average earnings for a Phlebotomist is \$30,000, while in California they may earn \$35,000 a year.

Individual student cost for the program is \$2,050. The AUMT Institute will receive \$2,000 of the cost, while the Paramount Adult School obtains a \$50 servicing fee.

PURPOSE: This cooperative relationship between the above stated parties, hereto, is made and executed this 14 day of September, 2017 for the purpose of jointly providing Phlebotomy Technician Certification courses to students enrolled at <u>Paramount Adult School</u>, as well as others who may not be enrolled.

The initial term of this agreement shall be from the date indicated above through 14 day of September, 2019 (2 years hence). At the end of the initial term, this agreement shall automatically extend from year to year to a maximum of 4 additional years from the initial agreement date. Either party may terminate this agreement by serving upon the other party a written notice, not less than ninety (90) days in advance of the termination on a date certain. Such termination shall not prevent those students already participating in the Phlebotomy Technician Certification courses from completing their course at **Paramount Adult School**.

RESPONSIBILITIES: AUMT INSTITUTE The Phlebotomy School understands and agrees to be responsible for the following;

- Obtaining California Department of Public Health Laboratory Filed Services approval to provide classes at <u>Paramount Adult School</u> as an additional training location of AUMT INSTITUTE The Phlebotomy School.
- 2. Providing complete Phlebotomy Technician Training courses including a minimum of 40 hours of Externship Training at an approved affiliated Medical Facility.
- 3. Providing all supplies and equipment needed for staff and students in the referenced classes.
- 4. Providing competent California department of Public Health-Laboratory Field Services approved Instructors and necessary support staff to teach the referenced courses.
- 5. Contracting with California Department of Public Health-Laboratory Field Services approved Medical Facilities within a 30 mile radius of the college for student externship purposes.
- Coordinating student placement at referenced externship sites for purposes of completing the State minimum 40 hour field requirement which shall include an equal balance of clinical laboratory assisting duties and administrative office duties including successful completion of 50 venipunctures and 10 skin punctures.
- 7. Ensure all supplies and material, including sharps, medical equipment and Biohazardous material are locked in a storage cabinet during non-class hours.
- 8. Will provide proper disposal of all Biohazardous waste in an OSHA approved manner.
- Paying to <u>Paramount Adult School</u> \$ 50.00 per student enrolled in each course. This shall constitute AUMT Institute's financial obligation responsibilities to <u>Paramount Adult School</u>; pursuant to this arrangement.
- 10. To indemnify and hold harmless <u>Paramount Adult School</u> and its employees/agents from any and all claims, damages, judgments, actions, and causes of Acting arising out of the acts of omissions of AUMT, its employees and agents, including the cost, expenses and legal fees incurred defending any and all such claims, actions and lawsuits. <u>Paramount Adult School</u>

agrees to give AUMT written notice of all such claims, damages, judgments, actions, costs, expenses and legal fees within 30-days after **Paramount Adult School** has knowledge thereof.

11. AUMT will provide limited accident insurance coverage for accidents caused by students. The professional liability insurance protection will be a minimum amount of one million dollars per occurrence and three million dollars aggregate. The parties understand and agree that the responsibility of AUMT for accident coverage caused by students shall be limited to and controlled by the terms of AUMT applicable insurance policy then in effect.

RESPONSIBILITES: **<u>Paramount Adult School</u>** understands and agrees to be responsible for the following;

- 1. Advertising the Phlebotomy Technician Course in printed and online class schedules.
- 2. Providing an open classroom with a projector, whiteboard, and tables/chairs/desks to accommodate up to 25 students at any time.
- Provide a Computer Lab with computers and internet to accommodate all students enrolled in the course for National Exam Testing upon completion of the Didactic portion of the course. National Examination scheduling will be scheduled as needed based on course completion dates.
- 4. Providing a locked storage cabinet or space to accommodate such in the classroom.
- 5. Providing any other reasonable accommodations necessary for provision of the course.
- 6. To indemnify and hold harmless AUMT, its employees, agents and students from any and all claims, damages, judgments, actions, and causes of action arising out of the acts or omissions of **Paramount Adult School**, its employees and agents, including the cost, expenses and legal fees incurred in defending any and all such claims, actions and lawsuits. AUMT agrees to give **Paramount Adult School** written notice of all such claims, damages, judgments, actions, costs, expenses and legal fees within 30-days after AUMT has knowledge thereof.

It is a course that helps students to create their own pathway to success in an authentic collaborative, entrepreneurship experience using INCubatoredu. Although a textbook is not required for this course, teachers and students will access INCubatoredu curriculum online to access various resources including daily teacher lesson plans that provide students with the opportunity to create and fully develop their own product or service. The classroom teacher, CTE curriculum specialist and administrators have all received INCubatoredu Startup Training.

The first year of implementation includes a one-time \$20,000 startup fee along with \$5,000 subscription cost which includes the following:

- Teaching and support material
- Coach/mentor recruitment
- Teacher/Coach lesson plans and presentations
- Online Learning Management System for classroom teacher and enrolled students
- Facility design and resources
- Professional development for classroom teachers, related administrators
- Online training for coaches and mentors

The annual subscription cost for year two and beyond is \$5,000 per school site.

There are currently five sections of this course across two campuses at Buena Vista High School and Paramount High School in 2017-18.

STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

This License Agreement (the "Agreement") is made and entered into as of July 1, 2017 (the "Effective Date") by and between Uncharted Learning NFP, an Illinois Not For Profit entity ("Uncharted Learning") and Paramount Unified School District.

In consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Uncharted Learning has developed various programs of study and related teaching and resource materials for use in elementary, middle, and high school classrooms;

WHEREAS, the School is a public school district located in Paramount, CA and is comprise of 1 high schools; and

WHEREAS, the School desires to obtain a license permitting it to use certain educational program materials and resources (as defined herein) licensed by Uncharted Learning in teaching its students on the terms and conditions set forth below:

NOW, THEREFORE, Uncharted Learning and School (each a "Party" and, collectively, "Parties") hereby agree as follows:

1. **RECITALS.** The Parties hereby adopt and incorporate the above recitals as if fully set forth in this Paragraph 1.

2. EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM. As used herein, the term "Educational Program" shall mean all

course materials

syllabi

lesson plans

communication aids

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- demonstrative aids
- audio / video materials
- training materials
- handouts
- presentations
- student assessments

- videos
- classroom designs templates
- brochures
- student activity guides
- reference tools
- community communication
 materials
- teacher training and professional development

and any other materials and services distributed by Uncharted Learning to the School in connection with the course identified in Appendix A, as well as all future derivative versions based in whole or in part on such materials.

3. COMMUNITY. Uncharted Learning licenses the Educational Program to multiple schools, including but not limited to the School that is a party to this Agreement. Uncharted Learning encourages collaboration and networking among educational institutions. In a spirit of cooperation, the School will make its participating sites reasonably available after appropriate advance notice for observation and inspection by other schools and may exchange information concerning the Educational Program with other participating entities. The Uncharted Learning community of schools may, in the exercise of independent judgment, share suggestions with Uncharted Learning for the continuous improvement of the Educational Program. Uncharted Learning welcomes such suggestions and, in furtherance of its mission and in accordance with Section 6, may implement those suggestions in the Educational Program and share those suggestions with the School and others.

4. DELIVERY. The Educational Program shall be delivered to the School via secure access online.

5. TRAINING. In conjunction with the license for the Educational Program, Uncharted Learning shall provide training to the School's employees (and volunteers if applicable) as set forth in Appendix B.

6. LICENSE. In consideration of the payment of the license fee hereunder, Uncharted Learning grants to the School a non-exclusive, non-transferable and non-sub-licensable license to reproduce and use, to the extent authorized herein, printed or electronic materials developed by Uncharted Learning in connection with the Educational Program for the sole purpose of providing instruction to students in the Educational Program course(s) at the registered schools or sites hereunder. Any other use, reproduction, disclosure, sublicense, loan, public performance, display or distribution of the Educational Program materials, including but not limited to commercial use, is prohibited. School shall comply with, and shall require its employees and agents to comply with, the terms of this License Agreement.

A. The School acknowledges that Uncharted Learning is not selling to School the Educational Program or any of the tangible expressions of the Educational Program (such as, but not limited to, copies of printed or electronic materials). All such materials are provided to School by license only.

B. The School may adapt the Educational Program for use in those schools designated in, and for the academic years, identified in this Agreement. Such adaptations do not and shall not vest any ownership or other rights in the School, its employees, or its agents to the Educational Program materials. Any and all adaptations of the Educational Program shall be deemed derivative works under the Copyright Act and shall legally be the property of Uncharted Learning. (For the avoidance of doubt, the foregoing sentence does not create any rights to, or interest in, student projects that are based on the educational precepts taught as part of the curriculum.)

Likewise, suggestions submitted to Uncharted Learning by the School may be incorporated without charge into the Educational Program by Uncharted Learning and

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shall be deemed the sole property of Uncharted Learning. Incorporation of the School's adaptations or suggestions into the Educational Program shall not confer any ownership or other rights upon the School, its employees, or agents nor shall it affect any license fees. Upon reasonable notice by Uncharted Learning, the School shall cause the execution of such documents by the School and its employees, contractors, or agents as are deemed desirable by Uncharted Learning to confirm and perfect Uncharted Learning's ownership rights in all materials (including derivative works) under this Agreement. Upon request from Uncharted Learning, the School shall cease using any adaptations of the Educational Program materials that Uncharted Learning deems in its discretion to be inconsistent with its educational purposes, rights in and to its trademarks, copyrights, or other intellectual property rights, or reputation.

C. The School shall not remove any copyright, trademark or other notices included by Uncharted Learning on the Educational Program.

7. LICENSE TERM. The license extended hereunder shall be for the School's 2017-18 academic year, beginning on July 1, 2017 and ending on June 30, 2018. After the termination of this Agreement, the School's right to use the Educational Program -- including any materials and access to any community channels -- shall cease immediately.

A. Automatic Renewal: The license shall be automatically renewed for subsequent academic years on the terms and conditions set forth herein. For purposes of this Agreement, references to the School's Academic Year shall be to the School's regular academic year as determined from time to time, but typically spanning from September until May. Either party may choose not to renew this Agreement by providing written notice to the other party at least 60 days prior to the end of the School's academic year.

8. **SET UP AND LICENSE FEES.** The School agrees to pay the license fees, subject to the terms and conditions as mutually agreed and set forth in writing in Appendix C.

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9. OWNERSHIP OF INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY. The School acknowledges and agrees that Uncharted Learning is and shall be the sole and exclusive owner of all rights and interests in and to the Educational Program, including but not limited to all curriculum materials, copyrights, trademarks, service marks, patent, trade secret, and other intellectual property rights associated with the Educational Program and all derivative works. Uncharted Learning reserves all rights as to the use and ownership of the Educational Program other than the express limited license granted to the School herein. The School acknowledges and agrees that neither party intends School to be a joint author or owner of any Uncharted Learning educational program within the meaning of the Copyright Act of 1976, as amended, and that in no event shall any Uncharted Learning educational program be deemed to have been developed with the intent that the School be a joint author or owner thereof.

A. The School agrees that it shall not do, or permit to be done, any act or thing that will in any way impair the ownership rights of Uncharted Learning as set forth herein, or to damage the goodwill of or otherwise reflect adversely on Uncharted Learning.

10. ACCESS TO LIMITED STUDENT INFORMATION. Uncharted Learning supports licensed schools and improves the quality of the Educational Program by evaluating the effectiveness of the Educational Program. Consistent with applicable law, the School agrees to provide Uncharted Learning with longitudinal student achievement data for the current year and for such other period (pre- or post-course) reasonably requested by Uncharted Learning to assess student outcomes. The School will reasonably participate in evaluation processes conducted by Uncharted Learning to assess the School and student performance. The School and Uncharted Learning acknowledge and agree that: (i) the School shall not provide Uncharted Learning with any personally identifiable data and shall act in accordance with reasonable privacy/security measures, proper professional practices, student confidentiality and applicable laws, including FERPA; (ii) Use or access to any protected data obtained as a result of these studies will be limited to representatives with a legitimate interest in accessing this data, which

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will include the District Administrator and the School Administrator and other persons who are specifically authorized by the School as having a legitimate interest in receiving the data; and, (iii) Re-disclosure of any personally identifiable information will be done in limited instances only, and only as allowed by, and consistent with, applicable laws. The School shall be responsible for identifying the individuals who will receive this data, implementing annual notifications, record-keeping and other such privacy requirements relating to these services. The School represents and warrants throughout the term of this Agreement that School is not in violation of and has taken and will take all actions required to be taken by it and pursuant to any applicable state, county, city and school district laws, rules and regulations, with regard to the subject matter of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, student confidentiality.

11. MARKETING AND PUBLIC RELATIONS. The School agrees to undertake reasonable efforts to market the Uncharted Learning Educational Program internally to its students and, as appropriate, to the surrounding community. Such marketing shall be designed to raise student and community awareness about the availability of the education program and the opportunities that it may represent. Such marketing may include:

- Banners or displays near the entrance of the facility or facilities where the Educational Program is being offered.
- Press releases (using standard text to describe the Educational Program as provided by Uncharted Learning).
- Discussion of the Educational Program on the School or district's website.
- Use of photographs of the School students and classroom environs as permitted by law. The provision of photographs to Uncharted Learning by the School or the posting of photographs of students participating in an Uncharted Learning class by the School on any publicly available website shall constitute (a) an acknowledgement to Uncharted Learning by the School that the photographs are authorized by the subjects to be publicly displayed under applicable law and

(b) permission for Uncharted Learning to reproduce and use, without fee, copies of such photographs in Uncharted Learning's promotional and other materials.

The School shall cease any marketing or public relations activity upon request from Uncharted Learning.

12. TRADEMARK USAGE. The School acknowledges that Uncharted Learning is the owner of one or more trademarks, including but not limited to Uncharted LearningTM, INCubatoreduTM, ACCELeratoreduTM, freshINCeduTM, Mobile MakersTM, MobileMakersEduTM and mixINCeduTM. Uncharted Learning hereby grants the School a limited license to utilize the specific Uncharted Learning Marks associated with the Educational Program licensed hereunder. The School acknowledges that it will comply with the Branding Guidelines attached as Appendix D.

13. CONSENT. For the term of this Agreement, the School consents that Uncharted Learning may publicly identify the School as a licensee of the Educational Program.

14. WARRANTIES. Each party hereby warrants and represents to the other that: (i) its signatory has been duly authorized on its behalf to enter into and execute this Agreement; (ii) it has the requisite authority to enter into and be bound by this Agreement; (iii) this Agreement, when executed and delivered by the parties, will constitute a valid and legally binding agreement, enforceable in accordance with its terms; and (iv) entry into this Agreement does not and the performance hereunder will not (a) violate any laws, rules, or regulations which govern such party or (b) constitute a breach, event of default, or violation of any agreement by which such party is bound.

A. The Educational Program is being licensed to the School "AS IS WHERE IS," and Uncharted Learning disclaims all warranties, whether express or implied. THIS AGREEMENT EXCLUDES ALL IMPLIED WARRANTIES, INCLUDING THOSE OF

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MERCHANTABILITY, FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE, AND NON-INFRINGEMENT.

15. DEFAULT. In the event that any party is in default of any material provision of this Agreement, and said default is not cured within thirty (30) days after receipt by the allegedly defaulting party of written notice reasonably specifying the nature of the alleged default, the non-defaulting party may terminate this Agreement, without penalty. License fees owed but not yet paid, shall be paid within 90 days of termination.

16. BINDING EFFECT. This Agreement shall be binding on the successors and assigns of the Uncharted Learning.

17. **ASSIGNMENT.** The rights and obligations established by this Agreement may be assigned by any Party only upon the written agreement of all Parties to this Agreement, provided, however, that Uncharted Learning may, without the need for the agreement of any other party, transfer any or all interests in the Educational Program and this Agreement to any successor entity, including, for example, a successor that acquires substantially all the assets of Uncharted Learning or a successor by merger.

18. **SEVERABILITY.** If any provision of this Agreement is found to be invalid or unenforceable by any authority having jurisdiction to so find, for any reason, it is the Parties' intent that the remaining provisions of this Agreement survive such invalidity or unenforceability, and remain in full force and effect.

19. **INDEPENDENT PARTIES.** Each of the Parties to this Agreement is an entity separate and apart from the others. Nothing herein does or shall be construed to establish a partnership, agency relationship, or any other relationship of responsibility such that any party is responsible for the actions or inactions of another party.

20. **EXCLUSION OF DAMAGES.** NO PARTY TO THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE LIABLE FOR ANY DIRECT, INDIRECT, INCIDENTAL, CONSEQUENTIAL OR EXEMPLARY DAMAGES WHICH MAY BE INCURRED, WHETHER FORESEEABLE OR UNFORESEEABLE.

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HOWEVER CAUSED AND UNDER ANY THEORY OF LIABILITY, DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY ARISING OUT OF OR RELATED IN ANY WAY TO THIS AGREEMENT, ITS BREACH, OR THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM. THIS EXCLUSION AND LIMITATION SHALL INCLUDE, BUT NOT BE LIMITED TO, ANY LOSS OF PROFIT OR LOSS OF GOODWILL, OR COST OF PROCUREMENT OF SUBSTITUTE GOODS OR SERVICES. THE EXCLUSION AND LIMITATION ON LIABILITY SET FORTH IN THIS IN PARAGRAPH SHALL APPLY WHETHER OR NOT A PARTY HAS BEEN ADVISED OF OR SHOULD HAVE BEEN AWARE OF THE POSSIBILITY OF ANY SUCH LOSSES. IF, FOR ANY REASON THE FORGOING EXCLUSION AND LIMITATION IS DEEMED NOT TO APPLY TO THE SCHOOL, UNCHARTED LEARNING'S AGGREGATE LIABILITY TO SCHOOL FOR ANY AND ALL DAMAGES, REGARDLESS OF THE FORM OF THE ACTION, WILL BE LIMITED TO REFUND OF THE THEN-CURRENT ANNUAL LICENSE FEE.

21. **NOTICES**. All notices required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing, delivered personally or by certified or registered mail, or overnight delivery by an established national delivery service at the following address:

All notices shall be deemed effective upon personal delivery or when received if sent by certified or registered mail or by overnight delivery.

22. ENTIRE UNDERSTANDING; AMENDMENTS; WAIVERS. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding and agreement of the parties with respect to its subject matter, and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous written and oral agreements with respect to its subject matter. Except as provided expressly herein, this Agreement shall not be modified, amended, or

in any way altered except by a definitive writing executed by both of the parties. No waiver of, breach of, or default under, any provision of this Agreement, or of any rights or obligations of any party hereunder, (a) will be effective unless in writing and signed by the party waiving compliance or (b) will be deemed a waiver of any provision, or of any subsequent breach or default of the same provision hereof.

23. FORCE MAJEURE. Neither party shall be liable for any failure or delay in the performance of its obligations due to fire, flood, earthquake, elements of nature or acts of God, acts of war, terrorism, riots, civil disorders, rebellions, or other similar cause beyond the reasonable control of the party.

24. **EXECUTION**. This Agreement shall become effective upon execution by all Parties.

25. GOVERNING LAW; VENUE. The Parties agree that this Agreement shall be enforceable subject to the laws of the State of Illinois without reference to conflicts of law principles, and that the exclusive venue for any claims resulting from a dispute regarding this Agreement shall be the federal or state courts encompassing Lake County, Illinois.

26. HEADINGS. The paragraph headings contained in this Agreement are for reference purposes only and shall not affect in any way the meaning or interpretation of this Agreement.

27. NO THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES. The parties to this Agreement are the sole and exclusive parties hereunder. Nothing in this Agreement does or shall be contused to create any third party beneficiaries.

28. TERMINATION. This Agreement and license granted hereunder shall cease upon the earliest to occur of: (i) the termination of this Agreement by mutual agreement of the Parties; (ii) the election by either Party not to renew this Agreement after its initial or any extension term; or (iii) Uncharted Learning providing sixty (60) days written notice to the School of its election to revoke the license due to a material breach by the School of any provision of this Agreement. Upon termination of the license. the School shall cease use of the Educational Program and all material provided to the School by Uncharted Learning under this

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Agreement. At the election of Uncharted Learning, the School shall return all such materials, including any reproductions thereof, to Uncharted Learning; all such materials shall be returned within fifteen (15) days after the School receives a notice from Uncharted Learning requesting return of the materials.

APPENDIX A EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM DEFINED

For purposes of the License Agreement dated July 1, 2017 between Uncharted Learning and

Paramount USD the Educational Program shall be INCubaotredu.

APPENDIX B TRAINING

Uncharted Learning makes available to teachers, mentors and volunteers a variety of live and web-based training courses and resources in furtherance of the educational goals of its courses. The training sessions shall be conducted, as mutually agreed by the parties, in person or via an internet-based delivery system such as a live webinar or pre-recorded materials. Such training may vary from Educational Program to Educational Program and from year to year and may be adjusted at the sole discretion of Uncharted Learning. In the event that the parties agree to live training, the School shall bear the costs of transportation and lodging.

I. INCubatoredu

Generally, the training associated with the INCubatoredu Educational Program includes:

Adoption Meeting: The Adoption Meeting is an initial session that is intended to address broadly the overall program content and implementation of the Educational Program. The Adoption Meeting will address, among other things, the identification and recruitment of subject matter experts (Mentors and others) in the local community, promotion, and funding. Senior School administrators and the teachers assigned to the Educational Program are strongly encouraged to attend.

Pre-Course Training: These live or web-based training sessions are made available to each teacher who will have primary responsibility for teaching the Educational Program. The School will receive advance notice of available dates and will be responsible for coordinating schedules with the individual teachers.

Attendance is strongly recommended for every teacher who has not previously taught the other Educational Programs. The decision to conduct live or web-based training shall be made by agreement between the School and Uncharted Learning.

Volunteer Training Session: With respect to certain courses and based on individualized circumstances, Uncharted Learning will make available on-line materials for training volunteers and, as appropriate, educators. These materials may include live webinars or pre-recorded materials.

Ongoing Support: Throughout the academic year, Uncharted Learning offers a variety of support through the following means; email, online workshops, webinars, and others to be determined by Uncharted Learning.

APPENDIX C LICENSE FEES: INCubatoredu Program

School agrees to pay the following license fees, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in the License Agreement:

A. Start Up Fee: The "Start Up Fee" shall be \$20,000. The Start Up Fee is a one-time fee paid in conjunction with the first Academic Year in which the Entrepreneurship Program is taught by at least a single school.

i. Start Up Fee for Additional Schools: If the School is a district, or has multiple physical locations licensed hereunder, there shall be an Additional School Start Up Fee of \$10,000 for each additional school at which the Entrepreneurship Program will be taught. The Additional School Start Up Fee shall be a one-time fee paid in conjunction with the first Academic Year in which the Entrepreneurship Program is taught by each additional high school. For illustrative purposes only, if a multi-school district with three schools enters into this License Agreement, it shall pay:

- \$20,000 Start Up Fee for the first year for the first school at which the Entrepreneurship Program is taught; *plus*
- \$10,000 for each additional school, for a total of \$40,000.

Ii, **Annual License Fee**: The School shall pay an Annual License Fee of \$5,000 per year/per school. For the avoidance of doubt, this sum is in addition to the one-time Start Up Fees.

B. Licensed Locations. The locations that are licensed hereunder are identified in Appendix C-1.

APPENDIX D TRADEMARK TERMS OF USE

By using an Uncharted Learning trademark, in whole or in part, you are acknowledging that Uncharted Learning is the sole owner of the trademark and promising that you will not interfere with Uncharted Learning's rights in the trademark, including challenging Uncharted Learning's use, registration of, or application to register such trademark, alone or in combination with other words, anywhere in the world, and that you will not harm, misuse, or bring into disrepute any Uncharted Learning trademark. The goodwill derived from using any part of an Uncharted Learning trademark exclusively inures to the benefit of and belongs to Uncharted Learning. Third-party use of the trademark is restricted and subject to the following:

• Except as expressly permitted, the Marks are not to be incorporated or included in product names, logos or internet domain names. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a Schools that has a current license to the Program offered by Uncharted Learning may identify that it is a licensee by using the following term:

The foregoing terms are to be used solely to promote official Uncharted Learning Educational Programs as offered by a particular licensed school. Nothing herein confers any rights of any kind to the Marks to the School. No entity may attempt to register the foregoing term as a trademark or service mark or otherwise claim any rights in the Marks.

- If used as part of a URL, the School may maintain the URL only so long as it is licensed hereunder. It shall assign such URL at no cost to Uncharted Learning upon termination of its license.
- No entity shall use the Marks in any manner that directly or indirectly implies a relationship, affiliation, or association with Uncharted Learning that does not exist.
- Disparagement or misrepresentations of Uncharted Learning services through use of the Mark, or by the use of confusingly similar wording, are strictly prohibited.
- Uncharted Learning prohibits use of the Marks as part of a link to or from any site unless establishment of such a link is approved in advance by Uncharted Learning in writing.
- On websites or promotional materials regarding the Educational Program, use the appropriate trademark symbol (TM, SM, ®) the first time the Mark appears in the text of the advertisement, brochure, or other material.

Suspected Violations

Uncharted Learning reserves the right to bring action against any party that violates Uncharted Learning's Agreement or terms-of-use concerning the Marks.

The Governing Board believes that the study of history and other social sciences is essential to prepare students to engage in responsible citizenship, comprehend complex global interrelationships, and understand the vital connections among the past, present, and future. The district's history-social science education program shall include, at appropriate grade levels, instruction in American and world history, geography, economics, political science, anthropology, psychology, and sociology.

The Board shall adopt academic standards for history-social science which meet or exceed state content standards and describe the knowledge and skills students are expected to possess at each grade level. The Superintendent or designee shall develop and submit to the Board for approval a comprehensive, sequential curriculum aligned with California's History Social Science Framework and content standards. The curriculum shall be designed to develop students' knowledge in history and social science and skills in critical thinking, research, and historical interpretation. History-social science instruction shall also include a focus on developing students' literacy skills.

The Board shall adopt standards-aligned instructional materials for historysocial science in accordance with applicable law, Board policy and administrative regulation. In addition, teachers are encouraged to supplement the curriculum by using biographies, original documents, diaries, letters, legends, speeches, other narrative artifacts as well as literature from and about the period being studied.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide a standards-based professional development designed to increase teachers' knowledge of adopted instructional materials and instructional strategies for effectively teaching history-social science.

The Governing Board is committed to providing a school environment that promotes the safety of students, employees, and visitors to school grounds. The Board also recognizes the importance of protecting district property, facilities, and equipment from vandalism and theft. To further the Board's objective, the School District's Safety Planning Committee shall meet as appropriate and/or deemed necessary to develop, implement and review District and building level safety practices.

Surveillance Systems

The Board believes that reasonable use of surveillance cameras will help the District achieve its goals for campus security. In consultation with the Safety Planning Committee and relevant staff, the Superintendent or designee shall identify appropriate locations for the placement of surveillance cameras. Cameras shall not be placed in areas where students, staff, or community members have a reasonable expectation of privacy. Audio recordings shall not be utilized by School District officials for surveillance purposes; such prohibition does not preclude the use of audio recordings by law enforcement officials as authorized by law.

Prior to the operation of the surveillance system, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that signs are posted at conspicuous locations at affected school buildings and grounds. These signs shall inform students, staff, and visitors that surveillance may occur and shall state whether the District's system is actively monitored by school personnel. The Superintendent or designee shall also provide prior written notice to students and parents/guardians about the District's surveillance system, including the locations where surveillance may occur, explaining that the recordings may be used in disciplinary proceedings, and that matters captured by the camera may be referred to local law enforcement, as appropriate. Any video recording used for surveillance purposes in school buildings, school transportation vehicles and/or on school property

shall be the sole property of the District.

To the extent that any images from the District's surveillance system create a student or personnel record, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the images are accessed, retained, and disclosed in accordance with law, Board policy, administrative regulation, and any applicable collective bargaining agreements.
