### Testing and Accountability Update

Margarita Rodriguez, Coordinator-Assessment & Accountability shared with the Board an update on the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP).

She shared that the purpose of the Smarter Balanced Field Test is to test the test, evaluate testing software, ensure quality of test questions, evaluate the effectiveness of the test administration and training materials, establish scoring and reporting levels and familiarize educators, administrators, and students with online testing. This year, students in grades 3-8 will be participating in the field test. The only students exempt from participating in the field test are students participating in the California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA) and for the English Language Arts/Literacy (ELA) test only, English Learners (ELs) who have been attending school in the United States for less than 12 months.

As the District prepares, on February 18 the State sent student information to test information site. The week of February 25-27, administrators and site coordinators participated in a CAASPP workshop. On March 10-11, test site coordinators received training on using the test information site. Throughout March 10-May 16, 2014, regular CALPADS updates will be done.

Field test item types include:

- Selected response (one correct response, multiple correct responses, two-part)
- Matching tables (yes/no, true/false)
- Fill-in tables
- Select or order text or graphics
- Drag and drop
- Graphing
- Equation or numeric response
- Short text
- Long essay

Paramount Unified School District's test preparation includes:

- 1. Training tests: allows students to experience interface features and functionality
- 2. Practice tests: approximately 30 items per test, including one performance tasks and scoring guide
- 3. Type to Learn: teach students keyboarding skills
- 4. Technology skills: age appropriate games to learn using the mouse, drag and drop, etc.

Students began taking practice training tests, Type to Learn and work on technology skills February 24 and will continue through April 4<sup>th</sup>. On March 31<sup>st</sup>, the K-8 District practice test will be administered at all schools and the District testing window for the Smarter Balanced field test is scheduled from April 7 – May 16, 2014.

The purpose of the K-8 District practice test is to test our scheduling and protocols, evaluate the effectiveness of the test administration and training materials, and familiarize teachers, administrators, and students with online testing. The field test is computer-based, not computer adaptive. It contains two components; 1. Performance task with an estimated time of 1.5-2 hours which involves a set of complex questions that is centered on a common theme or problem and requires that students participate in a classroom activity and 2. Nonperformance task with an estimated time of 1.5 hours and involves selected responses, drag and drop, and matching tables. Benefits of the online testing include:

- Prepares our students for success in a changing world
- Connects learning to life after high school-career or college
- Provides meaningful information about student progress and growth.

### Budget Update – Second Interim Report

Assistant Superintendent-Business Services, Dr. Michael Conroy shared with the Board that the District's Fiscal Stabilization Plan is guided by three principles: Ensure District Fiscal Solvency, Maintain Positive Labor Relations, and Advance Student Achievement.

The Second Interim Budget is based on:

- Governor's January Budget proposal
- What fiscal information we know today and
- Guidance from Los Angeles County Office of Education

LCFF budget factors include enrollment/ADA, District demographics, free & reduced student population, English Language Learners, Foster Youth, and State economics.

The District has budgeted \$109,588,329 in Unrestricted Revenues for 2013-14 at 2<sup>nd</sup> Interim. The majority of District funding is now coming from the State's LCFF Revenue Limit sources. The District also incurs \$12,700,165 in encroachment to cover other District programs that are not fully funded by the program sources, which results in a net revenue of \$96,888,164. Other State revenues are primarily CSR and Mandated Costs funds. Other Local revenues are primarily R.O.P. funds.

Total revenues of \$109,588,329 are reduced by encroachment, which reduces the overall available revenue for operational needs by \$12,700,165. Encroachment (or District Contribution) is used to cover other District programs not fully funded: Special Education (67%), Continuation School (3%), JROTC (1%), and Routine Restricted Maintenance (29%)

The District has budgeted \$98,704,807 in total operational Unrestricted Expenses at 2<sup>nd</sup> Interim. Education is primarily a service related industry, consequently as an organization the District spends the majority share of its budgetary resources in personnel related areas. Employee salaries account for approximately 60% of all expenses and employee benefits alone account for approximately 20%. All personnel related expenses comprise approximately 80% of all District expenses.

Committee members were generally receptive of the Governor's overall funding level and priority for LCFF implementation. However, a number of legislators questioned the Governor's proposal to create a continuous appropriation for LCFF funding going forward. The basic concern is that it hampers the budgetary discretion of the Legislature to change funding priorities in the future. The Legislative Analysts Office reinforced this concern. The District's next steps include: March

- Approval of 2<sup>nd</sup> Interim budget
